#### Dear Parents and Carers,

We are now in the closing few days of the academic year, with a lot going on and much to celebrate. This week saw the Reception children graduate. They all looked adorable in their mortar boards being applauded for completing their time in Early Years. Then on Thursday evening, the Year 6 children delivered a stunning performance of 'Charlie and the Chocolate Factory' as their end of year and end of school production. There were many tears, and I am sure there will be more next week. There was also a great atmosphere with all generations present getting up and dancing together at the end, to celebrate what they have achieved!

#### **Extreme Weather**

You will however be aware that the weather forecast for next week is for extreme weather. My phone currently predicts 37°C degrees on Monday with some forecasters anticipating that we may record 40°C degrees for the first time in the UK.

Our schools are not equipped for temperatures like these. We do not have air conditioning in classrooms. It is generally accepted that people work best at a temperature between 16°C and 24°C however when temperatures start to exceed 30°C, very high temperatures can affect the ability of staff and pupils to concentrate and to work effectively, and can cause physical discomfort and illness.

As the Head teacher I have the responsibility to ensure the health and safety of staff and children and so, it is my view that having classroom temperatures of what may be over 30 degrees for prolonged periods of the day on Monday and Tuesday in the current heat wave, does not support this obligation.

As such, in consultation with our Chair of Governors, I have made the decision that on Monday and Tuesday, lessons will proceed as normal for the morning. Children will then have their lunch inside as normal but will then return to the classroom.

# I am then inviting all of you who are able to, or wish to, to come and collect your children early, at 1:30pm.

This is the earliest that we can get all children fed and I did not want to have a staggered finish time that might leave some of you standing for long periods in the heat.

There is no obligation for you to collect your children early at 1:30pm. We recognize that some of you will not be able to because of work or other commitments, but I wanted to give everyone this option.

For those children who remain on site, the activities in the afternoon will be low key, calm and quiet. With less children on site, we will be able to group in areas that remain slightly cooler or in the shade outside.

Energy Kidz will be running as normal after school.

We are willing to have a light touch view of uniform on Monday and Tuesday. If children wish to wear lighter clothing they are welcome to do so.

We intend to have lots of ice pops to help cool children down. Please if you can make sure that they bring water into school with them, we will make sure that it is topped up.

Windows will be open, blinds will be down and with the exception of Church for the Leavers Mass first thing on Monday, we will avoid bringing the children together in a large group.

I share this so that you know we are taking all the measures that we can, but giving you the option to collect your children a bit earlier seems a sensible addition for the obvious reason that we create heat ourselves, so having fewer people together will reduce the heat for everyone at that hottest part of the day.

I hope those of you who have been worrying about this, will be reassured by all of the measures being taken. Thank you for your support.


- Wednesday 20 July—Year 6 Prom, 5:30—7:00pm
