Dear Parents and Carers,

Let me begin by saying how very sorry I am that there has been so much illness recently amongst the staff and children. This week, thankfully, we are starting to see some signs that the wave of illness may be moving on, so hopefully the children will be able to be in school during the next two weeks to enjoy all of the Christmas related activities and events that are in store. If it is any consolation, I am in regular contact with other headteachers and it seems that our experience at St. Luke's is mirrored elsewhere. As said by me previously, the only way to combat these illnesses is to maintain a high standard of hygiene measures. Please try and avoid large groups and make sure hands are being washed on a regular basis and for a prolonged period of time each time, at home. We remain in daily correspondence with Public Health, taking advise to manage this challenging time.

Learning Review of St. Luke's

I'd like to share something slightly different with you this week.

In this borough, the headteachers of all of the primary schools, seek to work in close partnership to support and challenge each other. A key element of our work together is that we take time away from our schools, to review the work that is happening in another school and give feedback for further development.

I have undertaken reviews of a number of schools in our local authority and this week, it was out turn at St. Luke's—to be reviewed.

To undertake the review, we had the headteacher of John Scurr Primary School and the head teacher of St. Paul's Way Trust Primary School.

Their review of our school focused on the teaching and learning and to inform the outcomes of the review, they observed teaching across the school, in a range of subjects, looked at children's work, spoke to the children about their learning and also spoke with staff about the development work on the curriculum and teaching that we have been doing.

I am pleased to report that their feedback was really positive. In particular they said they saw:

- A high level of vocabulary being used with staff modelling this vocabulary.
- Strong teacher challenge set for children and expectations.
- Strong ethos, environments and relationships.
- Lots of evidence of effective in the moment feedback to support children.
- An astonishing level of independent working with children working independently and constructively, even in the younger year groups, for at least 30 minutes in a lesson and achieving well.

We were pleased that the children reported to them that they had seen differences in their lessons this year and that they welcomed the changes because they had more time to do more work and finish their work!

I share this with you, because it can be hard as a parent to know if your children are receiving a high quality of education. Hearing feedback from external professionals is hopefully reassuring. They both felt that we are more than ready for our next Ofsted inspection, seeking a regrade to outstanding, whenever that may occur.

Despite us generally having a stable staff, from time to time our staff are given opportunities to develop their specialisms and careers. And it is precisely this that is leading Harriet Pickering, our SENCO, to leave St. Luke's at the end of this term.

Recognising the impact of her work here at St. Luke's, Harriet will be taking up the role of Outreach Teacher for Phoenix Special School. This will see her using her experience here, to support children and their families across the local authority. This is a terrific opportunity for Harriet and we are delighted for Harriet that her skills and experience have been recognised in this way.

I realise that this news may be a shock to many of you, particularly those of you who are working closely with Harriet. Please know, that we have been working hard to put a plan together so that support for you and your children continues after Harriet has left.

In the short term, we are delighted to have seconded the SENCO from Seven Mills Primary School to work with us on a part time basis. Also, some of you may already have come across Frances Jessie who did SEN work with us last year when Harriet was on maternity leave and Frances will continue to undertake case work with us as well.

In the long term, we will recruit a SENCO once again, however more than likely from our existing and talented staff. I am acutely concerned during this transition to minimise the disruption to classes, hence the initial short term plan outlined here.

I hope that you will join with me in congratulating Harriet on her new role. I know that many of you will be so grateful for the support that Harriet has given you during her time as SENCO here, and also class teacher previously, and will be sorry to see her go. Hopefully, in her new role, Harriet will very much be able to stay in touch.

Thank you to those of you who reached out, asking about Christmas Jumper Day and whether we are celebrating it at St. Luke's. How could we miss that! I have added it to the list of dates over leaf and we look forward to seeing all of the children in their lovely sparkly jumpers on the day.
