



## Newsletter 15th January 2021

Dear parents and carers,

I hope this newsletter finds you well, and that for the majority of our families that the first full week of remote leaning has gone well. As was the case in the first lockdown, there is much to communicate with you all, but I do hope that you find some of the resources that we are sharing with you helpful and supportive. It is also with great pride that I share examples of children's excellent work this week that has been sent to me by their teachers.

#### **Home learning**

Firstly, I would like to thank you for the effort that families have put in to ensuring that children are accessing the remote learning, as we do appreciate that this is not always easy. As I mentioned in last week's newsletter, the home learning is a requirement and we are monitoring children's level of engagement so that we are able to reach out to families who may be having difficulty and provide support where we can.

Many families have now collected a Chromebook to borrow from school, and if you do still require one please email Mike Gleeson, our school business manager, at <a href="mailto:sbm@st-lukes.towerhamlets.sch.uk">sbm@st-lukes.towerhamlets.sch.uk</a> Please note that we are still limiting this, for the moment, to one device per family to ensure that they are fairly allocated. We will review this position once we feel that most families have the devices that they need. We also have a limited number of 4G routers that we are able to lend out if you do not have broadband connection at home. Spelling lists and chronologies will be emailed to you at the beginning of next week, and will also be available on the school website.

Finally, please also note that we may try to contact you by phone over the period of lockdown. Not all staff members are on site every day so this call may come from a private number, rather than the school number at this time.



Please see below for some fantastic examples of work submitted by pupils this week. Well done to all of you; you should be very proud of what you have achieved!



This is Ethan Yu's English work in year 3. In English, the children have been learning all about Romulus and Remus. We have looked at the main characters and have written detailed descriptions about them. The activity was to tell the first part of the story as a comic strip. Ethan used some very good time connectives and excellent pictures to retell the story.







In year 6 the children have been writing autobiographies, and Ms. Lukwesa and Ms. Williams have chosen two excellent examples of writing for me to share with you.

### The first is by Javier Grinstead, with these words of praise from his class teacher:

In Year 6 we are learning about autobiographies, and we spent the week planning, writing and editing our own. It has been such a pleasure to read about his life, and to see the huge amount of effort that he has put into his writing from home. He has been working so hard in all of his subjects online, he should be truly proud of himself.

I was born on the 8<sup>th</sup> July 2010 in the Barkentine Birth centre on the Isle of Dogs. My parents told me that on the day I was born it was one of the hottest days of the year. For the first year of my life, I lived on the Isle of Dogs. My parents and I then moved to the seaside town of Brighton where we lived for six years. I loved to walk along the beach with my family and fish off the harbour with my dad. When I was 7, I moved back to where I was born and started at St Lukes School in year 3. When I arrived in London, I thought to myself wow what a big city this is. I really enjoy living in the city there is so much to do and see. I often go back to Brighton to see my nan and grandad and it brings back memories of living by the sea.

### The second is by a child in Willow class, who really impressed Ms. Lukwesa.

In Year 6, we have been writing autobiographies. On Wednesday, we focused on writing our second paragraph about our family. We were working on taking the reader on a journey through our memories and appealing to the reader through the use of humour and/or emotive language. We were all touched by this thoughtful and warm piece of writing.

#### All About My Family:

Growing up, my family and I lived in a small flat in White chapel, London. My dad originally came to London from Bangladesh. He lived and studied there until his family decided to come to here. Soon after, he found a low-paid job at a restaurant near home. My dad had a friend back home in Bangladesh – who happens to now be my mum – and they were very close so my dad's parents brought her to London and somehow, they got married (I don't remember much). Despite the fact that she was 17, she took good care of my older brothers and I.

Since my parents and grandparents were all from Bangladesh, they spoke Bengali (my brothers could also speak some). My brothers and I used to make fun of the way some of the words sound. Irritably, my grandparents lived with my two older brothers, me and my parents in our tiny cramped flat. I wish we could have moved out but sadly my family were very poor so we couldn't.

My mum was really funny. Every day we would have a time where we all sat down and listen to her funny jokes and riddles. Even though she couldn't speak much English. Talking about English, my mum was also very keen about school. She never wanted us to miss a day. My brothers would always try and teach me new words by reading books with me.


Grace! Well done The Beast


