Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope you are all well and that you have enjoyed a good week. Two pieces of good news to share: Firstly—both Ms. Rothon and Ms. Erler have given birth to baby girls and both mums and daughters are well!!

Secondly, we are delighted at St. Luke's because over the weekend we had a new sound system installed in the hall. Sound in the hall has long been a source of frustration for many of us, particularly when the children are performing assemblies or productions. The children practice really hard yet hearing them can be a real challenge. With our new sound system, this should no longer be a problem, so I was keen to share this good news with you all.

Key Stage 1 SATs

Next week the staff in Year 2 will begin the tests for the KS1 SATs, reading and mathematics. The staff have a timetable and hope to complete most of them, with most children, during the next two weeks. The tests will be done in accordance with the statutory guidance from the DfE but not in such a way that causes the children any stress.

We really do not want anyone to worry themselves or their children about this, as that would be both detrimental and unnecessary. Throughout the year, the children have worked hard and made strong progress. The tests that they sit, contribute to the final outcome but they do not dictate it. The work that is in the children's books, that they have accomplished during the year, is just as important in determining the outcome of the SATs.

What will help the children though, is getting a good night's sleep, healthy diet and lots of water. That will help them to be at their most alert and therefore most likely to be able to perform well. If you have any concerns at all, please come and speak to us so that we can help to resolve them.

Key Stage 2 SATs

These take place for four days starting on Monday 13 May. The children are invited to come into school early and have breakfast together. We have found in previous years, that this has really helped to settle the children and ensure that they are ready for the tests.

As for the Year 2 children, we do not want anyone to be worrying about these. The children have worked consistently really hard all year and they are well prepared for these tests. It is our belief that we do not perform well when we are stressed, so the staff have done everything they can to avoid stress for the children. I was very proud of my maths group because when I asked them how they were feeling about the tests, they said they were excited!!

A good quality night's sleep, healthy diet and lots of water are important in the lead up to the week and during the week.

Also, the avoidance of anything that may upset them or play on their minds. Please have oversight of what your children are doing on line or with an electronic device. Children preoccupied with upsetting behaviour from Whats App groups or chat rooms, will not perform their best in the SATs which is such a waste given their hard work to date.

Again, if you have any concerns as Year 6 parents, about the SATs or about your child's on line presence, please do not hesitate in coming in to see us.

Lost uniform

I have sent 5 enormous bags of mislaid uniform to the launderette this week for a service wash. When it is returned it will be laid out on tables for you to collect and any that is not claimed will be sent to the charity shops.

Additionally, on Fridays, Bob will put the coat hook units that are used at lunch times out into the back playground by the school hall at the end of the school day. Uniform that has been discarded during the week may be on those coat hooks.

If you know your child has lost something during the week, I would encourage you to have a look there at the end of each week.

Daily Mile

Children in Years 3—6 do what is called 'The Daily Mile' each day. This means they run for 5 minutes. There has been much research into the health benefits of doing this as well as its positive impact upon learning in the classroom. I mention this here because you may want to take this into account when buying footwear for your child to wear, or bring, to school.

Our uniform remains the same, with the expectation that children wear entirely black shoes, but we are happy if those shoes are entirely black plimsolls or trainers. If children would rather wear a shoe, they can also bring a sports shoe in to school to change into for their running if they find that easier and safer to run in.

Please remember that we have a long weekend and school resumes on Tuesday 7 May.

Year 3

We are so excited about literacy this week because we have begun our new text, 'The Sheep Pig'. We haven written diary entries from the perspective of Babe when we first comes to the farm. In Destination Reader, we have been focusing on using inference skills to dig deeper in characters thoughts and feelings. In Maths, we have been focusing on using column addition and subtraction to solve some tricky problems!

Year 4
