We have been so impressed by the children when they have come back to school; with their lovely smiling faces beaming positivity and enthusiasm for seeing each other, the staff and even for doing some 'normal' school work!

I am pleased that we have been able to create the opportunity for children from all year groups who wanted to, to come back before the Summer holidays. We look forward to seeing the children from Years 3 and 5 next week.

Staffing and classes for next year

Once again, I apologise for the confusion last Friday where in the second version of the newsletter, the table was unclear. I have included that table again this week over leaf for your reference. We will make sure that by the end of term, the children have all had the opportunity to meet their new teacher, whether that is in person or on Zoom.

Arrangements for September

The government circulated their guidance for schools in September, yesterday. Much of it had been leaked in advance so there were no real surprises. The key message is that everyone is expected to return to school in September and schooling once again will become mandatory.

Over the next couple of weeks, the staff, governors and I will work through the guidance and adjust our plans and risk assessments accordingly. Before school closes for the Summer holiday, I will make sure that we have shared the intended arrangements with you for September.

I think it is only fair that I share with you now, the possibility that we may not be able to provide before and after school care in September, at least in the first instance. Obviously, we recognise the demand for that provision, particularly for working parents, however logistically with the numbers of Bubbles and children, this may prove too difficult to manage. However, please know, that we will do our best and we will let you know before the end of term so that you can make alternative arrangements if need be.

Furthermore, we may need to adjust the start and end of the day times, to enable each 'Bubble' to enter and exit the building safely and without coming into contact with any other 'Bubbles' so please anticipate that children may start and finish the day up to half an hour earlier or later. In reaching any decision on this, we will hold in mind families with children in different year groups and the impact of such an arrangement on them, and we will also seek to keep disruption to a minimum.

Aside from that, our calendar dates for next year remain the same and are available on the school's website.

The staff and I start the year with two INSET days on the 1st and 2nd September.

The children will start to come back on **Thursday 3rd September**. There will of course be the expectation that children are in full school uniform once the new academic year starts. Details of our school uniform expectations are available on the school's website.

Arrangements for next week and the final week of term

As said, next week we are looking forward to seeing the children in Years 3 and 5 who have reserved their places. By now, parents of children with places will have received a letter regarding the arrangements for drop off and pick up. Please can we ask that parents do not linger on the site and remember to observe social distancing with staff and other people's children. Please also remember that start and end times are being strictly adhered to, to ensure the safe entry and exit of children to and from their bubbles. Children may be dropped at 8am for before school provision or between 8:45 and 9am for the normal school day. All children finish school at 3:30pm with no after school care.

The school year finishes on Friday 17 July. The staff will be on Teams until 3:30pm but further work will not be supplied through Teams over the summer. Holiday care over the Summer will be available with Energy Kidz. With very best wishes, Rebecca Abrahams


