Progress with welcoming children back to school_Nursery, Reception, Year 1 and Year 6

It was great to welcome children in Year 6 back to school this week, two groups, each for 2 days.

We have risk assessed each of the Bubbles, and by the time you read this newsletter, if you have requested a place for your child in school, in the second phase of returners, you should now have received a letter from us to confirm arrangements.

We will welcome the additional children into Nursery and Year 1 on Monday 22nd June and into Reception on Wednesday 14th June.

Please note, that for Nursery, Reception and Year 1, after 3 surveys and two rounds of admissions, we are now full to capacity in each of the Bubbles. If you decide you would like your child to return, all we will be able to do at this late stage is add your child to the waiting list, and it would require someone to cease attending before they could be admitted.

For **Year 6**, we still have some places, so if you change your mind and would like your child to attend, please let us know by Tuesday 23rd June and we will seek to include them from Monday 29th June.

The **Key Worker provision** continues, so as always, if you are under pressure to suddenly return to work, please let us know and we can try to include children from Nursery, Reception and Year 1 as well as other year groups in that provision instead.

Return to school arrangement for children from Year 2, 3, 4, and 5

As said in last week's newsletter, we are looking at a model so that the children in each of these year groups get to return to school for a fixed period of time (hopefully a week) so that they can have closure to this academic year and be prepared for the new academic year in September.

We cannot plan this safely without exact numbers. If you would like your child to return to their year group, please email as follows, no later than **5pm** on **Tuesday 23rd June**. *Please note that we have to be strict with deadlines and therefore we will not accept any requests after this date and time*.

We will confirm arrangements for the next phase of returners by close of day on Thursday 25th June.

I was so pleased when the teachers in Year 2 chose to share some work this week. Despite the challenges of working remotely, the children are continuing to work creatively! What memorable learning!


In Year 2 our maths lessons have focused on learning about shape this week. Here are some creative pictures using 2D shapes.

Worried About Secondary School?

It is an unusual time for our Year 6 children. Usually, they would be visiting their new schools and getting ready to take part in introduction days. While we will be discussing secondary school transition with your child, they may still have worries. This week, you will receive an online copy of a booklet produced by The Tower Hamlets Educational Psychology Service. The booklet is intended to support parents and carers with addressing worries that your child may have. Process for getting a Covid—19 test done:

We have had feedback from a member of our community who did a Covid—19 test and we thought it would be helpful to share this with you as a useful point of reference in case any of you need to take one.

GP surgeries are not able to help.

After clicking on <u>https://www.nhs.uk/ask-for-a-coronavirus-test</u> the process is self explanatory and straightforward to follow and complete. Within 48 hours you receive the COVID 19 kit delivered via Amazon. It is then picked up the day after, once you have taken the test, by a Royal Mail courier so you don't need to leave the house and it's all free of charge.

I would suggest that the test be taken as close as possible to the collection time as the results will be more accurate.

If you are sending your child into school with a packed lunch, please remember that we are a nut free school. Please avoid putting products with nuts into the lunches as this could cause an allergic reaction for another child on site. Thank you for your help.
