Dear parents and carers,

What a week it has been. As you are no doubt aware from your children, there have been some issues this week with the provision for **lunch**. I did meet with Principles on Thursday morning and there was a significant improvement for Thursday and Friday. Attached to this newsletter, is a letter from them to you, explaining the position and offering ways to stay in touch with you over the coming weeks to ensure that the consistency of provision is secured.

The other pertinent issue at the moment is of course, the **Coronavirus**. I want to reassure you that I receive daily information from the Department of Education and Public Health England about the Coronavirus. To implement the guidance effectively we are checking with families returning from travel, where they have been. We also appeal to you please, if you have traveled recently, to familiarize yourselves with the guidance available on the internet and to take the precautions seriously, if the guidance does relate to you. We have distributed posters throughout the school, along with additional hand sanitizer and soap. Children are being encouraged to wash their hands regularly throughout the day. We have also distributed lots of boxes of tissues and children/staff who have runny noses are being encouraged to 'catch it, bin it, kill it' afterwards, in line with the best practice being encouraged.

World Book Day

Thursday, March 5th is World Book Day. In school, the children will spend the day celebrating reading and taking part in several activities. We encourage the children to come in dressed up as their favourite book character. Please don't feel you have to rush out and spend money on this, we love seeing homemade costumes! SEND Funding Tower Hamlets are planning to make cuts to current SEND funding levels. This will include a reduction of EHCP funding for schools by 2% and over £1,000,000 cut from the Support for Learning Service. Our school currently uses the Support for Learning Service to help assess children for Special Educational Needs and go on specialist training to ensure we are supporting children in the best way we can. Today every child will be sent home with a postcard, please take the time to fill in this postcard and send it on to your local MP, councillor or Mayor John Biggs.

'**We Are Fetching**' is an app that has been developed by an Island parent to support parents in managing the school run digitally, by sharing the after school care of their children with other people they know and trust.

I met with the parent who has designed the app and I have agreed for her to be able to come and share the app with you in case any of you would like to trial it.

The app works by allowing a parent to create a secure profile connecting them with other parents, and together build a network of 'fetchers' that they approve to pick up their children. If a parent collects another person's child as well as their own, the idea is that they will earn credits that can be used when they need their own child collecting. This does not have to be a regular commitment. By picking up any child from the network, on a day that suits this parent, they earn credits to use on days when managing the school run is more of a challenge. My understanding is that they are developing the credits to act like 'rewards' that can also be cashed in with particular businesses.

The school will be automatically notified when someone other than the parent is due to collect a child, with a photo of the 'fetcher', to ensure each child is passed to the correct person.

If you decide to trial this with the developer, our school will be one of the first schools to test this new technology. I am interested to see whether this could support what can be a challenging time for parents, when an issue makes us late to collect our children.

Rachel Beech is the local parent and she will be here at St. Luke's at the following times next week, to meet you, if you are interested:

- The coffee morning at Community House on Monday 2 March from 9am;
- On Tuesday 3rd March, in the school at 9am, 4pm and 5:30pm to further introduce the app and help interested parents to start using the app. She will bring a few of her existing test users with her to ensure that no one is kept waiting.

Please understand this is not a school product, but I am sharing it with you because it may have potential. You'll have to try it out, but if you do find it helpful, we would certainly want to do our part to make sure it can be used effectively.

I have not had the chance to check uniform this week, but will be doing so next week. On the topic of clothing, as the cold weather continues, please make sure all children have coats so they can wrap up warm when they are outside.
